Definition: An abstract is a concise summary of your body of work.

Tips to writing a good abstract:

- Know your audience - keep it EM focused.
- Organize your thoughts and outlines.
- Write your abstract & proofread it before submission.
- Write a **short** and eye-catching title.
- Adhere to the word limits.

Pitfalls

Cramming too
much information
so your message is
lost

Presentation Formats

Podium Presentation:

Present your work at the podium with an accompanying slide show.

Poster Presentation:

Present your work in the poster area with an accompanying single slide e-poster.

Presentation format will be assigned by the scientific committee after the screening stage. Preferences are taken into account, but not guaranteed. Please be patient.

Abstract Categories

There are three categories for submission.

Cases

Share learning through cases

- Common presentation of uncommon complaints.
- Uncommon presentation of common complaints.
- Unexpected events or challenges.
- Clinical variants.

Research

Share study ideas, protocols, trials.

- Clinical research
- Quality improvement project research
- Thesis work
- Innovation in EM

Expert Opinions

Shared by subject matter experts, grounded in evidence-based science

Must be practitioners post-PG training completion to submit in this category.

- Topic updates.
- Evidence updates.
- Case scenarios may be used for emphasis.

Submissions in any category must focus on **Emergency Medicine**, pertaining to the first few hours of patient care in the **Emergency Medicine Department**.

All abstracts must be submitted using our **Abstract Submission** form, accessible on the homepage during the submission period, which will be announced on the website.
